Each month we will introduce you to one of our members of the governing body here at Leavening and also use this opportunity to inform you of some of the work in which they do.

This week we are delighted to hear from our Co-Opted Governor - Jan Lomas

Happy New Year to all families and staff returning for the new term at Leavening
Primary School! Having spent my whole career working in school, I know only too well the excitement of a fresh start and new opportunities at the beginning of term - always tinged with a little flutter of trepidation when thinking about the challenges ahead!

This is my second term as a Co- Opted Governor, at Leavening and it is already clear to me that this is a school community that places the welfare of children, families and staff at the centre of all it does, with the aim of ensuring all can thrive and flourish and reach their potential. As part of my work as a governor, I have been asked by the Board of Governors and Headteacher to take particular interest in the work of the school in relation to well-being for all and education tailored for Special needs. This means making specific visits to school to talk with the headteacher, staff, children - and parents if appropriate, about the work of the school in this area. The visit also includes visiting classrooms to enjoy seeing learning happening in practice!! I have already begun these visits - reinforcing my positive view of the hard work of the school in meeting the needs of individuals in its care - and I hope to continue over the rest of the year.

When governors visit school in this way they report back to the whole governing body team about their area, thus sharing the important role of being well informed about the school and the breadth of its work. They visit to ask questions, to learn and to listen - not to inspect! Such feedback adds to the understanding and awareness that allows the governing body to carry out its role in effectively supporting and being a critical friend to the school on its journey of continual improvement.
