Our overall, whole school topic is **blood, bottoms and burps** which will be launched through an interactive children's first aid course! This is a brilliant opportunity for the children to extend their knowledge of how to react in an emergency.

English:

In line with our overall topic of "Blood, Bottoms and Burps", we will be diving into the gut and writing explanation texts to follow "the journey into the wonderful world of your microbiome".

We will be reading the book "Gut Garden" and finding out the different functions of the body through this.

We will also be reading "Can you feel the noise?" by Stewart Foster to link to our science topic of sound.

We will also be exploring Haiku poetry and writing our own based on the famous pattern!

Maths:

We will be kicking off the new term with a focus on number, place value and the four written methods!

We will also be launching some new home learning within maths – look out for information coming soon!

Science:

In science, we will be learning all about sound. We are using our researching, investigating and concluding skills to test out how sounds are made and how we can distort them. Our 'working scientifically' focus is 'comparative and fair testing', which we will be practising through different sound-based experiments.

History:

This half term in History, our topic is: *How has the role of the monarchy changed throughout British history after 1066?* We will be learning about famous kings and queens such as William the Conqueror, Henry VIII, Elizabeth I, Victoria, and Elizabeth II. The children will discover how monarchs in the past held great power, how events like the Magna Carta and the English Civil War changed this power, and how today's monarchs have more ceremonial roles. By the end of the unit, the children will be able to explain how the monarchy has evolved over time and why it is an important part of Britain's story.

Computing:

Our computing topic this term will first recap our online safety skills as a class. Years 3 and 4 will then focus

on their topic 'The Internet', whilst years 5 and 6 focus on 'communication and collaboration'.

DT:

In DT, we will be exploring moving parts, pulleys and levers to design moving bodies! We will be practising our planning, making and evaluating skills and developing positive constructive feedback.

PE:

In PE, we will be learning netball. This 'Netball' unit will teach the skills players need to play both in defence and attack. The children will learn how to pass and catch the ball using a range of techniques. Defensively, they will develop their skills of marking, including one-on-one marking. Offensively, they will learn how to get free from a defender using skills such as the dodge and straight lead run and the skill of pivoting. They will also learn the technique for shooting and how to do a toss-up. Different netball rules will be covered each week and there will also be a focus on playing as part of a team and evaluating their own and others' performances. The unit culminates with a High 5 Netball tournament, where the children will have an opportunity to put their newly developed skills into practice in competitive games.

RE:

Year 3 and 4: Why is Jesus inspiring to some people?

Year 5 and 6: What would Jesus do? (Can we live by the values of Jesus in the 21st century?)

This half term in RE, we are exploring the life and teachings of Jesus from the perspective of Christians. In Year 3/4, the children are learning why Jesus is inspiring to some people, looking at his teachings and how Christians celebrate Holy Week and Easter. They will understand key ideas such as the gospel, incarnation, and salvation, and why Easter is important to Christians. In Year 5/6, the focus is on the question "What would Jesus do?" and whether we can live by his values today. The children will study his parables, explore themes of love, forgiveness, justice, and generosity, and consider how Jesus' teachings might guide Christians in modern life, including in moral dilemmas.



Music:

As musicians, we will be exploring pulse and rhythm. We will read traditional rhythm notation and learn about ostinato and composing rhythm patterns. We will work in groups to create a piece of music based on word rhythms linked to body parts. We will use the pentatonic scale to add pitch to our compositions. We will also listen to music to develop our ability to feel the pulse, recognise ostinato and instruments, considering a range of styles. We will prepare the songs for the Young Voices performance and the Christmas Production.

Music topics will now be completed termly rather than half-termly.

French:

As French linguists, we will be securing our knowledge of French numbers and building on the range of numbers we can understand. We will be learning and revising how family members vocabulary practise being able to state names and ages of different people. We will also work on securing the months of the year linking them to the seasons and numbers, learning how to talk about birthdays. We will explore fetes and celebrations in the French culture and learn a little more about how Christmas is celebrated in France. We will be using our listening, speaking, reading and writing skills alongside singing songs and playing games in French.

French topics will now be completed termly rather than half-termly.
